BAYSIDE QUILT GUILD BOARD MEETING OCTOBER 1, 2020

In attendance: Monica Agapaloglou, Jan Bohn, Anita Brayton, Dael Cowdrey, Chris Dorset, Jackie Granger, Alice Kish, Sharon Miller, Sharon Perry, Lisa Schober (by phone), Jo Verne.

President Sharon M. called the meeting to order at 10:06, welcomed everyone and thanked Chris for allowing the Board use of her garage as a meeting site.

1920 Challenge:

Anita said she had 7 responses so far. She asked Sharon M. to send an email blast asking for last minute entries and for any Covid-19 quilts that members would like to send in as well. Entries and submissions DO NOT HAVE TO BE QUILTED!! The quilts and un-quilts will be shown at Quilt Vine in Trappe on Wednesday, October 14, 2020.

2021 Quilt Show:

We talked about have a show in the 2 churches with antique quilts. Right now, that isn't feasible. We will revisit this in March.

2020-2021 Meetings (Guild and Board) - 2020-2021 Programs/Camps:

There are no meetings, programs or camps scheduled for the future. It was decided to investigate signing up for a ZOOM account and having on-line lectures and perhaps classes on Zoom in lieu of in person meetings. Anita is including a survey about interest in the next newsletter. As circumstances change, we will revisit our meeting/class/camp decisions. Anita is also researching other ways of having lectures and classes, costs, etc. so that the Guild might be able to function in the coming months more normally, just differently.

Tax Filing Issues:

Dael and Lisa have gotten the Treasurer's files and Kitty Reiser and thank her very much for all her help!! A letter was received from the State of Maryland stating that the Guild is not in compliance with some tax forms outstanding. Dael and Lisa are meeting with our accountant to find which forms are missing and correct this. A discussion was held on the pros and cons of remaining a 501C-3 or reverting back to a club. Dael and Lisa will report on that in the future.

2020-2021 Budget:

Dael and Lisa passed out the 2019-2020 actual versus budget numbers. As it appears our 2020-2021 income will be close to non-existent, the 2020-2021 budget will include only necessary expenses, e.g. insurance, accounting fees, P.O. Box. An amount to be determined will be included for programs to cover ZOOM fees and lecturer fees if we go that route. Costs of classes that may be offered will be covered by fees of attendees. Dael and Lisa will present a budget after meeting with the accountant and deciding what are the essential expenses.

A motion was passed unanimously to approve an outline of a budget until after the November 9th accountant meeting.

Other Business:

Sharon P. mails out 1 newsletter each month to a member who has no computer (the fee is \$25.00/year). It has gotten more expensive than that. It was decided Sharon should determine the cost and then inform her of the new cost plus let her know of other options to receive the newsletter electronically, e.g., through the library, a friend's email.

Alice brought up the email vote for the new Board. There are 136 on the email list and 81 of those voted. The assumption is no vote meant consent.

Food for thought: We all need to consider the Guild's financial future. Our dues will not sustain us in the future. Future fundraisers will not be on the scale of the Quilt Shows (which provided us with a 2-year income). This @(#\$*&% may be gone as soon as a vaccine is available but may not. And a vaccine may not be available as soon as we think. Put on your thinking caps!!

The meeting was adjourned at 11:26AM.

We have become accustomed to having lectures and workshops come to us. Not seeing my quilting friends, being able to go to a quilt show or workshop, or tend to our Bees has sort of dulled my quilt sense. I've been working on UFO's and discovered there is a reason I didn't finish them. Sooooo, how can we get going again as a guild but not meet in person?

As you see in this issue I'm starting with a bit of a challenge. I think a Sew-A-Long could be fun but *need some ideas from you*. I'm not a teacher so I'd need some help in that area. Candy Stiffler has been doing some of these on Facebook. Any and all program ideas are welcome. I may not use them all but at least they will be reviewed.

I'm assuming most of you are familiar with the computer application ZOOM. I think a lot of us use it to "see" our friends and relatives. Hundreds of domestic and international quilt teachers use that platform now. Some I looked at are booked through 2021! I see many advantages to the presenter. An advantage to us is we don't pay travel expenses. We'd also be able to book speakers that have been geographically unavailable. They charge the same as in-person lectures and workshops.

To effectively use ZOOM, you need a good internet connection for your computer/device. You would need to download the ZOOM app to your device. If you want to join the meeting (lecture or class) a code is used to sign-in.

CAMPS? They are really popular and it was a great way to socialize with our fellow quilters.

Suffrage Challenge Walk By Show & Tell And Covid Quilts (Finished or Just Tops)

October 14



A few months ago Sharon Miller and I issued a challenge to Baysiders to commemorate the 100th anniversary of the 19th Amendment passage. We intended to have the quilts revealed at our August meeting, Well, you know what happened, but as the above slogan states Bayside is moving forward into the light. We're going to have a Walk-By Show & Tell where we can look at real quilts, not pictures and vote for your favorite.

Entries will be displayed similar to a tiny quilt show with personal distancing and masks. Don't forget your name tag so

we can identify you.

Where? Quilt Vine, Trappe

When? October 14, 2020. The second Wednesday of the month, our regular meeting day. (Plenty of time to finish or start, right?)

What will be on display? Suffrage Challenge quilts and, if space allows, a Covid commemorative quilt or a quilt you have made since March 17th or a quilt top made since March 17th.

Here are the details:

Set-up 10:30 AM-11:30ish. BRING IN YOUR QUILT and help hang it.

View & Vote 1:00 PM-3:30 PM. (2-4 white glove volunteers Needed.)

Take-down 3:30-4:00PM PICK UP YOUR QUILT or make arrangements to have someone else pick it up for you by 4:00 PM.

Masks and safe-distancing are required. Bring your own pen and paper to cast your vote.

The Initial Challenge

Hello, Bayside Quilters. Now that our Suffrage challenge is wrapping up it's time for a new one. The idea behind it is to use some of our scraps and connect with another Baysider. We're doin' it "old school," we're going to mail our finished project.

We all have initials. This challenge uses our first, middle and last initial to get us inspired and challenged to make a mug rug that will be given to another Baysider.

Size: 4" x 6" Mug Rug (Size it to fit into letter size envelope, which is actually a little smaller than 4".)

First Initial: Color choice. If you can't think of a color that begins with that letter try a paint store paint chip rack for a color name.

Second Initial: Block or Theme. Blocks go by many names but if one doesn't suit you, go with a theme.

Third Initial: Quilting style. You might have to do some real spinning of this term. My last initial is B. Bold quilting? Basting? Bobbin work?

Be sure to sign it. Send it and a SASE* to me, Anita Brayton, 29439 Hemlock Ln, Easton, MD 21601. Postage should be about \$1.50 each way. A letter size envelope should be the appropriate size.

Due Date: December 31, 2020. This is the last day for you to get it in the mail to me. Once I've collected all of them I'll mail you a Mug Rug made by another Baysider. When you get yours you may send the maker a Thank you note or give them a call and perhaps make a new friend.

The more participation, the more connections we can make. Make as many as you want and that's how many you will get in return. Happy Mugging!

Voting Rights History in Maryland



The Maryland Center for History & Culture has launched a virtual exhibit following the timeline of the battle to win voting rights for all Maryland citizens. The web site is <https://www.mdhistory.org/virtual-exhibit/forgotten-fight/>. Look under Museum and then Exhibits to find it. Here are some highlights.

1802: The Maryland General Assembly declares that only “free white males” can vote, barring any prior voting by free black men.

1818: Jewish Baltimoreans petition the Maryland General Assembly to allow Jewish people to hold public office. Over the next several years, Thomas Kennedy, an Irish Catholic Delegate of Washington County, and U.S. Senator William Pinkney would work to propose a constitutional amendment removing

the religious test for state office holding.

1826: After many attempts, the “Jew Bill” is passed by the Maryland General Assembly. Maryland is the last state to remove the prohibition on Jews holding public office.

1866: Maryland native, educator, and abolitionist Frances Ellen Watkins Harper speaks at the inaugural meeting of the American Equal Rights Association, a short-lived multi-racial coalition that also included many of the same members as later organizations, such as its president Lucretia Mott.

1867: New Maryland state constitution changes rules for representation, further disenfranchising African American voters and giving rise to former Confederates and the anti-suffrage Democratic Party.

1872: Days before the Republican National Convention, Delegate Stevenson Archer gives the speech: “Woman Suffrage not to be tolerated, although advocated by the Republican candidate for vice-presidency”, on the floor of the Maryland House of Representatives, in opposition to President Ulysses Grant’s potential running mate Senator Henry Wilson. The leading candidate for vice President Wilson was a vocal supporter of women’s suffrage and African American civil rights.

Stay tuned, more to next month.

It was a landslide win for Warren G. Harding won the 1920 Election. He was a long-time advocate for women’s suffrage. According to Readers Digest ...“an estimated 10 million women voted on November 2, 1920, in the presidential election, that was only approximately one-third of those who were eligible. Even though this meant that men outnumbered women at the polls five to three, many newspapers across the United States reported long lines of enthusiastic women eager to cast their votes for the first time.”

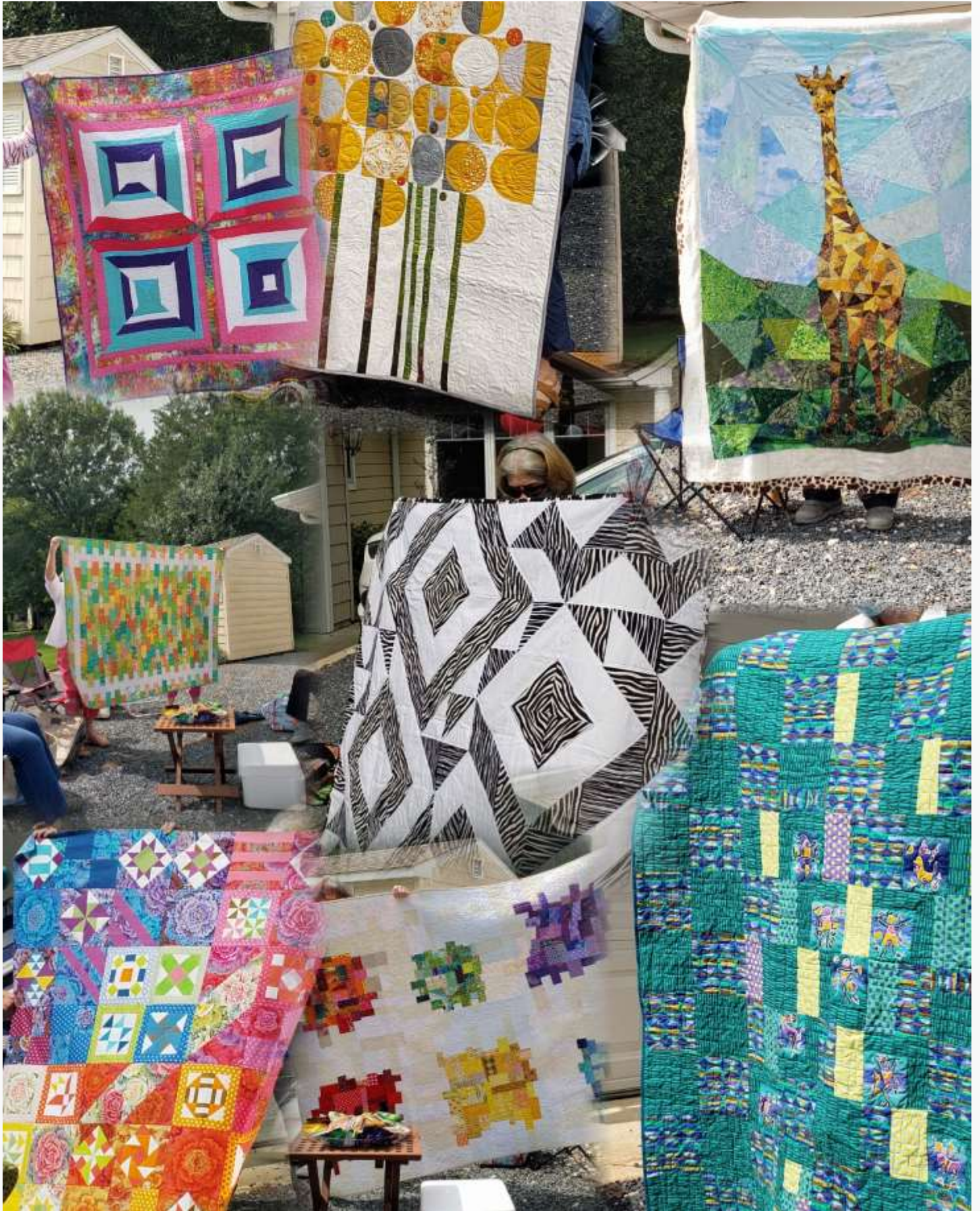
“The latest quilt is a gift from my sister, Gail Benjamin, and me to our nephew and his new bride.

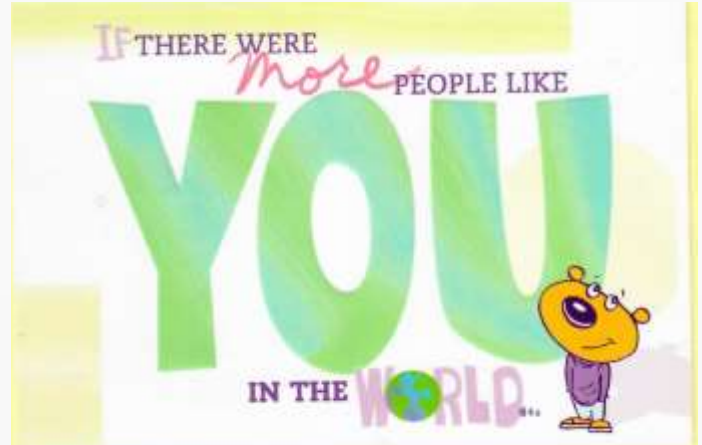
OCTOBER OUTREACH NEWS
